

New Jewish Electorate Institute poll finds Jewish voters support pro-Israel, pro-peace policies

Most Jewish voters hold pro-Israel, pro-peace views

- 87 percent of Jewish voters say that someone can criticize policies of the Israeli government while still being pro-Israel.
- 61 percent of Jewish voters would support a two-state solution, compared to 20 percent who favor a single state that would be neither Israel nor Palestine and 19 percent who favor full Israeli annexation of the West Bank.
- 71 percent of Jewish voters consider US financial aid to Israel important. 58 percent also say that they would support restricting US financial aid to Israel so that it cannot be used to fund the expansion of settlements in the West Bank.
- 62 percent support restoring humanitarian aid to the Palestinians.

Most Jewish voters approve of President Biden, overwhelmingly prefer him to Donald Trump

- 80 percent of Jewish voters approve of President Biden's job performance and 66 percent plan on voting for a Democratic congressional candidate in 2022.
- 70 percent of Jewish voters have a favorable view of President Biden, and 59 percent have
 a favorable view of the Democratic Party. In contrast, 78 percent of Democratic voters have
 an unfavorable view of Donald Trump, with 76 percent having an unfavorable view of the
 Republican Party.
- 64 percent of Jewish voters trust President Biden more than Donald Trump to fight antisemitism. In addition, 65 percent trust Biden more than Trump to handle Iran, and 63 percent trust Biden's approach to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict more than Trump.

Jewish voters wary of antisemitism, particularly from the right-wing

- 90 percent of Jewish voters are concerned about antisemitism in the US.
- 61 percent of Jewish voters say they are more concerned about antisemitism that
 originates from right-wing groups and individuals, compared to 22 percent who are more
 worried about left-wing groups and individuals, and 12 percent who are equally concerned about
 both.

All data are from a poll conducted online by GBAO Strategies on behalf of the non-partisan Jewish Electorate Institute (JEI), which surveyed 800 self-identified Jewish American registered voters between June 28 and July 1, 2021. The poll has a margin of error of ±3.5 percentage points.
